#### 09:30 Balkan Jazz - Jacky Comforty

Balkan Jazz tells the life story and music of Niko Nissimov and his Jewish friends from the Bulgarian Jazz band, The Optimists. The movie charts their rise to stardom as a band in late 1930s Bulgaria. The beginning of WWII changed everything for them as Bulgaria joined the Axis powers. Anti-Jewish laws and restrictions brought the band to a halt. All men were drafted to slave labor camps, and the entire community was on the verge of extinction. Niko was saved by his friends at the last minute from a transport destined for the death camp of Treblinka.

#### 11:30 The Immigration Boat Salvador - Nissim Mossek

The Immigration Boat Salvador tells the story of the forgotten story of the illegal ship Salvador, which sailed from Bulgaria to Israel in 1940 with 352 passengers on board, but sank off the coast of Turkey. Of all the passengers on board, only 122 survived. Using archival materials and interviews with survivors, the director, Nissim Musk, tells the story of Salvador and the story of the immigration of the Jews of Bulgaria, and also dwells on the way the disaster was received among the Israeli population - being ignored.

#### 13:30 Empty Boxcars - Edward Gaffney

Empty Boxcars tells the amazing story of the survival of over 50000 Jews in World War II and the mass murder of 11393 Jews from territories under Bulgarian control in Greece and Macedonia. The plot to murder all European Jews was marked 'top secret' but was brazenly public. Footage of the trains renders the crime visible. When the plot is exposed, Bulgarians from many walks of life, church leaders and labor leaders, lawyers and doctors, rose up in protest. Would we risk our lives to save someone in deep trouble? These courageous Bulgarians encourages us to think we must, and so we can.

#### 15:30 The Optimists - Jacky Comforty

How were 50,000 Bulgarian Jews saved from the Holocaust despite the intense efforts of their government to deport them? The Optimists tells the dramatic story of how people of all ethnic backgrounds and religions at the eleventh hour, secured the safety of their Jewish neighbors.
